Bushfires are a huge threat, but also, in some cases, just a part of nature. But if we are locked out of the Wombat State Forest, in a year or so, all of the tracks kept clear by sensible 4wding, bike riding and other recreational activities will be overgrown. Then, if a fire starts in the forest, the CFA will not be able to access the bushland to be able to fight the fires, and these fires, as we have seen from history, can be devastating.

Lives lost, homes lost, people having to start again, when it can be somewhat prevented. I'm not saying it will be perfect, but at least having a chance to try and fight a raging bushfire is better than not being able to, and watching a community perish.

Hunting: I am a hunter, and my wife is about to join me in gaining her gun license and do some shooting. I shoot for enjoyment, but always shooting animals declared as a pest, and a quick kill. The Wombat State Forest already has pests including wild pigs, rabbits, foxes and more. If we are locked out of the Wombat to protect it, all we will be doing is letting the pest animals take over, and destroy what native flora and fauna do exist now.

My wife and I had our engagement party in the Wombat State Forest. It was fantastic. We were able to invite any of our family and friends, we camped overnight, had awesome food, and the only thing left behind to give any indication we were there was the burnt-out campfire. It was wonderful. It was us, just relaxed, out in the forest, enjoying the fresh air.

We want to continue these recreational activities with our children, and show them the history and natural beauty of the Wombat State Forest. Exercise and fresh air are fantastic for children, and getting them involved in things is the best way for them to learn. Have you ever been yabbing? Fishing?
